Multi-State Poll - Arizona Findings July 2020



Survey Methodology



TargetSmart designed and administered this multimodal survey. Four hundred and eighty-eight interviews were conducted online among panelists who were matched to the TargetSmart voter file (500 weighted), 63 interviews were conducted online using text-to-web and email-to-web (15 email, 48 SMS) solicits from the TargetSmart voter file (40 weighted), and 50 interviews (61 weighted) were conducted via live phone calls (47 wireless, 3 landline). In total, the survey reached 601 adults, age 18 or older, who are registered to vote in Arizona. Quotas were designed to reflect the demographic and geographic distribution of registered voters in Arizona. The data were weighted by gender, age, race, TargetSmart Partisan Score, TargetSmart High School Only Score, and region by county to ensure an accurate reflection of the population.

The credibility interval (the theoretical margin of error for a blended-methodology poll that relies partially on telephone-based probability sampling, and partially on non-probability based online panel sampling) is +/- 4.0%. The margin of error for subgroups is larger and varies. Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding



Issue Environment and the Role of State Government

Issue Environment: Key Findings

- Arizona voters are highly pessimistic about the direction of both the United States and the state of Arizona. Over 6-in-10 voters believe both are heading in the wrong direction.
- Concern over the coronavirus pandemic dominates among Arizona voters, as 51 percent of voters cite it as the most important issue facing Arizona these days - surpassing concerns about illegal immigration, opening the economy, and education by over 40 points.
- With the acute outbreak facing Arizona, over 3-in-4 Arizonians believe the worst of the pandemic is still yet to come.
- A majority of Arizona voters indicate that their feelings about how Black people and communities are treated in America have changed over the last month in light of recent events (54 percent).









Election and Democracy Reforms

Democracy Key Findings: Government's Role, Voting Options, and Intersection with Race

- State government's role in election administration surfaces as a top priority for Arizonans -- voters unanimously believe that state government should play a role in safely and fairly administering elections (93%), with 78 percent believing state government should play a "major" role".
- Voting by mail remains the most popular voting option for Arizonans, with over 3-in-4 voters planning to vote by mail in November's elections (77 percent). In-person voting options are far less popular, with just 14 percent of voters planning to vote in-person on Election Day and 7 percent planning to vote early in-person.
- We also find that 2-in-3 Arizonans want state government to reduce barriers that stop Black people from voting and participating in elections (63 percent).



Democracy Key Findings: Voting Reforms

- Although very few Arizonans plan to vote in person this year, they are supportive of opening additional polling locations to reduce crowds (85 percent) and lengthening the early voting window and letting voters cast a ballot in-person up through the day before Election Day (80 percent).
- Arizona voters are also broadly supportive of reforms that make processing mail-in ballots easier and more efficient -- nearly 3-in-4 voters support counting mail-in ballots postmarked by Election Day, but received after Election day (74 percent).



Democracy Key Findings: Coronavirus and Voting

- Although in-person voting is far less popular than voting by mail among the Arizona electorate, voters here strongly agree with measures to increase safety and sanitation standards at polling places.
- Nearly 9-in-10 voters agree that poll workers should be provided with PPE like masks and gloves (89 percent).
- Similarly, 9-in-10 voters agree that polling locations should conform with CDC guidelines on sanitation and social distancing (87 percent).
- Voters also broadly support opening additional polling locations to reduce crowds (85 percent support) and oppose consolidating polling locations in anticipation of poll worker shortages (58 percent oppose).





Democracy Key Findings: Voting Security


- Since voting by mail is extremely popular with the Arizona electorate, the security of mail-in votes is a very high priority.
- Eight-in-ten voters believe ballot tracking for mail-in ballots is important (82 percent), with 58 percent of voters finding this to be very important.
- Likewise, voters almost unanimously believe it is important for election officials to immediately notify voters if there is a problem with their submitted mail-in ballot (95 percent), and 73 percent of voters find this to be very important.





Ballot Tracking Importance



Fiscal Policy and the Economy

Economic and Fiscal Key Findings: Coronavirus and the Economy

- The coronavirus pandemic is a top-of-mind concern for a majority of Arizona voters. When it comes to the debate between economic vitality and public health, Arizona voters express more concern about health and safety (68 percent) than they do about the pandemic's impact on jobs and income (26 percent).
- Voters also tend to believe that Arizona businesses should provide safe working environments and be held liable if they do not (59 percent). Just 24 percent of voters believe businesses should be protected from liability if an employee gets sick on the job.
- Although Arizonans highly prioritize their health and safety over jobs and income, they do express strong concerns around small business closures and employment. Eighty-seven percent of voters are concerned about small business closures due to the pandemic, and 84 percent of voters express concern about lost work and income.



Economic and Fiscal Key Findings: Budget and Revenue

- Consistent with findings from previous SiX polls conducted in Arizona, we find that voters
 here want more state investment in core services, even if it means they have to pay higher
 taxes.
- Nearly 2-in-3 voters believe Arizona state government should invest more in its residents to
 ensure they are safe, healthy, and economically secure (63 percent), while just 16 percent of
 voters prefer state government keeping taxes low and cutting funds to services like
 education, unemployment, and health insurance
- Furthermore, 68 percent of Arizonans express concern about the state losing tax revenues and facing budget cuts in the wake of the pandemic, with 1-in-3 voters expressing they are very concerned about this (31 percent).
- At the same time, voters here support an array of revenue streams to help with budget shortfalls in the wake of the pandemic -- they strongly support tax increases and penalties on companies that pollute Arizona's air and water, policies that close tax loopholes, and increased taxes on corporations and the wealthiest Arizonans.



Economic and Fiscal Key Findings: Economy and Workplace Policies

- A solid majority of Arizona voters believe state government should address economic barriers faced by Black people and the Black community (58 percent).
- Consensus public opinion emerges around state government ensuring equal pay for equal work, as 77
 percent of voters believe state government should play a role in making gender pay equity a reality.
- A slim majority of voters (51 percent) support extending the length of time Arizonans can receive unemployment compensation and increasing the amount laid-off workers receive.
- Over 7-in-10 voters believe state government should play a role in ensuring all workers have access to paid sick and family leave (71 percent).
- Similarly, almost 2-in-3 voters believe state government should have a role in ensuring Arizonans have access to affordable childcare (63 percent).
- It follows that voters in Arizona are broadly supportive of policies that expand paid sick and family leave, including creating an insurance plan to provide paid leave for employees (77 percent), requirements for workplaces to provide paid sick leave (77 percent), and eliminating tax breaks for corporations that don't offer paid sick and family leave (72 percent).



Economic and Fiscal Key Findings: Health Policy

Arizona

- Policies related to affordable health care and insurance during the pandemic surface as some of the top tested economic proposals in this survey.
- Near-consensus public opinion emerges around the following policies related to health insurance and health care:
- Banning the practice of surprise medical billing (89 percent).
- Extending grace periods for people to pay health insurance bills (88 percent).
- Offering Arizonans public health insurance options (87 percent).
- Limiting what drug companies can charge for prescriptions (85 percent).

Notably, 19 percent of voter rank this as their most prioritized economic policy.









Recommendations

Democracy and Voting Narrative

- Arizonans want state government to play an active role in election administration and most voters are quite confident in it's ability to do so. The Democracy and voting narrative should highlight legislators' abilities to be proactive and involved in election administration.
- Since vote by mail is an incredibly popular option for Arizonans, the narrative should be centered on legislators' efforts to streamline the vote by mail process and ensure that the process is safe and reliable.
- Legislators should highlight policies that make ballot counting and processing more efficient and meticulous, as well as improvements to ballot tracking and notifications about ballot issues.



Fiscal Policy and Economy Narrative

- Arizona voters clearly prioritize government investment in core services over tax cuts, and they support progressive avenues for raising revenue to make this happen.
- As the coronavirus takes an exacting toll on Arizona, voters express profound concerns around unemployment, small business closures, and rent and mortgage payments.
 Progressives should directly connect a big picture narrative around government needing to play a bigger role in the state with the immediate challenges posed by the pandemic.
- Workplace policies should be the focal point of this narrative. Legislators should highlight policies that hold employers accountable for ensuring safe workplaces, create paid sick and paid family leave requirements, and make childcare more affordable for working Arizonans.
- Voters here also highly prioritize health care and health insurance reforms, so this is another clear opportunity to engage. Policies that make health care more affordable during the pandemic are strongly supported by the Arizona electorate, particularly ending surprise medical billing, extending grace periods to pay medical bills, offering public health insurance plans, and reducing the costs of prescription drugs.
