Survey Methodology

TargetSmart designed this online survey. The survey reached 1,247 adults, age 18 or older, who indicated they were registered to vote in Florida. Interviews were conducted online among panelists who were matched to the TargetSmart voter file from six opt-in panel providers. Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic and geographic distribution of registered voters in Florida. The data were weighted by gender, age, party registration, race from file, TargetSmart High School Only Score, and region by county and media market to ensure an accurate reflection of the population.

A representative base sample of 697 respondents was augmented by an oversample of 550 respondents who live in Hillsborough (109 interviews), Miami-Dade (115 interviews), Orange (100 interviews), Osceola (35 interviews), Palm Beach (100 interviews), and Pinellas (91 interviews) counties. The oversamples were weighted into the base such that the overall effective sample size is 700. No margins of sampling error are calculated for this survey, as this statistic is only applicable to fully randomly sampled surveys, which this survey is not due to its reliance on non-representative optin panels. Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding.
