Arizona Statewide Issues Poll - February 2022

Prepared for the State Innovation Exchange by **TargetSmart**



Survey Methodology

TargetSmart designed and administered this multi-modal survey. The survey was conducted February 15 to 22, 2022, via live phones with trained operators, online via a link from an email, and through Dynata's web panel and matched back to the voter file. The survey reached 577 registered voters statewide (500 weighted) who were age 18 or older and indicated they were registered to vote in Arizona. The statewide sample was augmented by a suburban Valley oversample of 202 registered voters in the following ZIP codes:

Phoenix and Scottsdale: 85023, 85022, 85032, 85053, 85027, 85024, 85085, 85254, 85260, 85258, 85253, 85028

Mesa: 85202, 85210, 85204, 85203, 85213

Chandler and Gilbert: 85233, 85225, 85286, 85248, 85249

Seventy-nine respondents from the statewide base sample were registered to vote in the listed ZIP codes, and they were added to the 202 oversample respondents for a total of 281 Valley respondents (200 weighted).


The sample was randomly selected from TargetSmart's enhanced voter file. Sixty-one percent of respondents were reached on phones (70 percent weighted). Thirteen percent of respondents completed the survey online and were reached via an email (8 percent weighted). Twenty-six percent of respondents were recruited from Dynata's web panel and matched to TargetSmart's voter file (22 percent weighted). Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic distribution of registered voters in Arizona.

The data were weighted by gender, age, race on file, party registration from file, TargetSmart Midterm General Election Turnout Score, TargetSmart High School Only Score, self-reported vote for president in 2020, and region by county, State Senate district, and zip code to ensure an accurate reflection of the population.

Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding. The credibility interval (the theoretical margin of error for a blended methodology poll that relies partially on telephone-based probability sampling, and partially on non-probability based online panel sampling) is +/- 4.4% for the statewide total and +/- 6.9% for the Valley oversample.

Key Findings

- Arizona voters are pessimistic about the direction of the state, and they continue to support more state investment over more and more austerity.
- Education funding and immigration are the top issues about which Arizonans are concerned. Rising costs, specifically food, gas, increasing rents and the high cost of housing, are also top of mind for voters.
- While a majority of Arizonans oppose abortion restrictions and a Texas-style abortion ban, voters are uncertain about the future of Roe vs. Wade, and few are following the issue closely.
- Although education funding is a key concern, voters are split on repealing the spending limits and are divided on expanding school vouchers.
- A majority of Arizonans feel voting should be more accessible, but voters are split on if barriers or fraud is a bigger issue, and almost two-thirds support voter ID requirements for vote-by-mail.
- Arizonans overwhelmingly support legislation to increase conservation efforts, and over 80% have concerns about Southwest Gas.

Direction of Arizona - Time Series




Direction of Arizona: Right Direction - Wrong Track by Party Registration














Q.14 How closely would you say you are following news about the issue of abortion these days -- very closely, somewhat closely, not too closely, or not closely at all?



Likelihood SCOTUS will Overturn Roe Vs. Wade




















