Georgia Statewide Issues Poll - December 2022

Prepared for the State Innovation Exchange by **TargetSmart**



Survey Methodology



TargetSmart designed and administered this multi-modal survey. The survey reached 1,330 adults (1,000 weighted), age 18 or older, who indicated they were registered to vote in Georgia. The survey was conducted **December 14-20, 2022**, via live phones with trained operators, online via a link from a direct SMS, and online through Dynata's web panel and matched back to the voter file. The statewide sample was augmented by an oversample of 102 Black registered voters (81 weighted), 85 Latinx registered voters (26 weighted), and 113 rural registered voters (96 weighted).

The phone sample was randomly selected from TargetSmart's enhanced voter file. Sixty-one percent of respondents were reached on phones (67 percent weighted). Twenty-five percent of respondents completed the survey online and were reached via SMS (22 percent weighted). Fourteen percent of respondents were recruited from Dynata's web panel and matched to TargetSmart's voter file (11 percent weighted).

Quotas were assigned to reflect the demographic distribution of **registered voters in Georgia**. The data were weighted by gender, age, race on file, TargetSmart Partisan Score, TargetSmart Midterm General Turnout Score, TargetSmart High School Only Score, self-reported 2020 presidential vote, and region by urbanicity and media market to ensure an accurate reflection of the population.

Percentage totals may not add up precisely due to rounding. The credibility interval (the theoretical margin of error for a blended-methodology poll that relies partially on telephone-based probability sampling, and partially on non-probability based online panel sampling) is +/- 3.1%.



Key Findings

- Georgia voters broadly support investing the state's budget surplus in a variety of social services such as health care, housing, infrastructure, and education, and by a wide margin they prefer these investments to more tax rebates.
- We measure strong support for expanding Medicaid coverage, legalizing marijuana, and increasing the minimum wage.
- Investing in education is a clear priority for Georgians. More public school funding and raising teacher pay receive overwhelming support.
- Voting reforms tend to be more polarizing than economic reforms, though increasing polling locations and immediate notification of ballot issues are both unifying and popular.




Public Investment

Georgia voters reject austerity as state government's role

INVEST: State government in Georgia should invest more in education, infrastructure, and health care for its people, even if that means the wealthy and large corporations have to contribute more in taxes.

TAXES: State government in Georgia should keep taxes low on the wealthy and large corporations, even if that means less funding for education, infrastructure, and health care for its people.




Q.9 Which of these statements comes closer to your own view, even if neither of them is exactly right?

Public school funding




Q.10 Generally speaking, do you believe Georgia public schools receive not enough funding, the right amount of funding, or too much funding?















GA voters overwhelmingly support increasing minimum wage from \$5.15/hr to \$15/hr



Even more consolidated support behind increasing the minimum wage from \$5.15




Q.16 Do you support or oppose a proposal to increase Georgia's current \$5.15 an hour minimum wage? (SPLIT - Effective Base 500)








